Law-enforcement entities, specifically the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Forces, have integrated NetSmartz into school and community programs. NetSmartz provides law enforcement with presentations for students, parents, guardians, caregivers, and communities.

States can partner with NetSmartz to make the program a part of their curriculum. NetSmartz assists states with an implementation plan, training, and press announcements. States partnering with NetSmartz receive downloadable versions of the interactive activities to install on school computers.

NetSmartz has been implemented in more than 3,000 BGCA Clubs nationally, serving more than 3.3 million young people.

Sponsorship from private corporations enables the NetSmartz Workshop and its innovative content to be shared globally via the Internet.

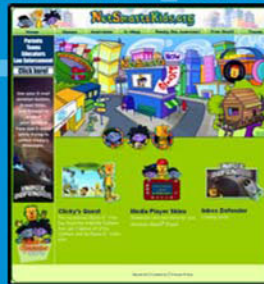

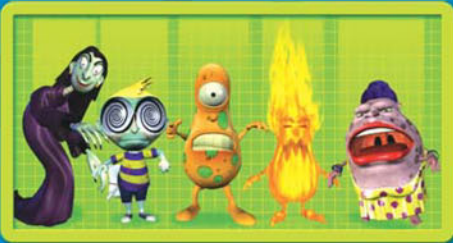
